SUMMARY

Surveys of adults in New London have been conducted five times by the New London Campus & Community Coalition (NLCCC), beginning in 2008. In summer of 2015 – as in 2014, 2013 and 2012 – young people were dispatched to various locations in the community to ask adults to respond to a two-page questionnaire. A total of 195 responses were recorded in 2015 (Table 1), compared with 534 in 2014, 415 in 2013, and 595 in 2012. Results of the community surveys may be viewed on the NLCCC web site [1,2].

The demography of the 2015 survey sample is displayed in Table 1. Tables of substance-related data are organized by reporting results for all respondents, and by dividing them into groups according to their demography, whether the respondent is: (1) aware of NLCCC, (2) a resident of New London, (3) a parent of child under 21, and by the (4) age-range and (5) gender of respondent, and (6) whether the household income is above or below \$35,000, the approximate median from prior surveys.

Questions on the community surveys have varied somewhat over the years, depending on what information has been important for evaluation of coalition efforts and the public's main sources of information. Several questions have been included in all NLCCC community surveys, and trends are summarized in Figures 1-4.

Considerable research has been conducted and publicized regarding the damaging effects of alcohol on neurological development in the adolescent. Awareness of these effects has increased among New London adults since 2008, and about 75% indicate they are familiar with this information (Figure 1, Tables 8,9) About the same percentage are also aware of the damaging effects of marijuana use. Awareness is somewhat greater among adults who are familiar with NLCCC and its messages (Table 8).


Some parents express a belief that some use of alcohol by their older children is acceptable, so the child learns to drink responsibly, and is thus protected from excessive consumption as a young adult, especially in college. This idea has increased from about 5% of adults in 2008 to 15% since 2012 (Figure 1, Tables 8,9). There is less acceptance of this idea among parents than non-parents (Table 8), and among adults of age 21-44 (Table 9).




Figure 3. NLCCC Youth Surveys: Perceived Great Risk of Harm

The perception of risk of harm from regular use of a substance is highly correlated with the likelihood that it will be used. Risk of harm is therefore a federally-mandated "core measure" in youth surveys, and has also been included in community surveys. Most New London adults express a belief that regular use of cigarettes, alcohol, or prescription drugs carries a great risk of harm for a teen. Perception of great risk from marijuana, however, decreased from more than 80% in past years to less than 60% in 2015 (Figure 2, Tables 2,3). Perception of risk of harm from marijuana is also low and decreasing among youth (Figure 3), probably at least in part a reflection of the opinions of parents and other adults in the community. Clearly, continuing the efforts to educate both youth and adults in New London about marijuana is necessary.

The accessibility of alcohol, marijuana, and prescription drugs (without one's own prescription) has increased in New London since 2012, according to the community survey (Figure 4, Tables 6,7). NLCCC youth surveys since 2006 agree with this perception, that easy access to cigarettes, alcohol, and marijuana has been increasing [3].




